## Peter Sinclair - an Appreciation.

Many of you have heard that Peter recently suffered a stroke. He was home at the time but as not found for some hours, which will slow his recovery and make it more difficult. Taken to hospital in Kingston, he is progressing nicely but it will be some time before he will be back to normal.

Born and educated in the mid-west, where his father was an artist, Peter too, dev-eloped artistic interests. He studied and taught at the University of Wisconsin, later continuing with the study of art in Italy, particularly Florence.

He always had a keen interest in early- especially primitive- arts and crafts. After moving to New York City he started a business mounting examples of art for museums, antique dealers and private collectors. This work requires artistic sensitivity as well as technical prowess (he has mounted African carved masks, religious figures, weapons, models, items large, small and varied- even manhole covers). Moving to Ulster County, his New York clientele continued to seek him out in addition to local dealers. During his recuperation, Zoe Bissell, his talented assistant will continue the work.

Because of Peter's interest in cultural arts, for some years he published *Living History*, a publication encouraging the revival of forgotten arts and trades, and the tools used in connection with them. It also included American Indian lore- another of Peter's favourite studies.

A few years after becoming involved with the Dutch Barn Preservation Society, he started the Mid-Hudson Chapter of that organization. This led to the origin of the Society for the Preservation of Hudson Valley Vernacular Architecture (HVVA) which Peter established in the mid 1990-s. With Peter as the prime mover and shaker, the group arranges tours of early Dutch (and other) houses and barns; assists with workshops- teaching skills such as thatching, how to construct a hay barrack or move a barn. The group also aids historical societies and old house and barn owners with advice; provides displays for regional festivals and helps historic groups with programs. HVVA has also published Dutch Vernacular Architecture in North America, 1640 - 1840 produced by HVVA member John Stevens. This traces building development and details from European precedents to their use in the United States and Canada.

Another facet of HVVA is its monthly *Newsletter*. Produced almost entirely by Peter, it contains information about buildings examined by members, relating discoveries to examples in the Netherlands and elsewhere; reports on upcoming events of special interest to the group, and maintains contact with vernacular study groups throughout the World.

In the ten years that the HVVA Newsletter has been published, Peter's work has contributed significantly to the history of the Hudson Valley region, investigating, recording and sharing information on early structures that no other organization or individual is doing. For this he deserves hearty appreciation from the State of New York. A quiet, modest man with a constantly enquiring mind and boundless enthusiasm, we look forward to his complete recovery.


